Keynote Speakers – Between the Lines: Decoding and Defying Censorship in Libraries

Erin Berman is a fierce privacy advocate, formerly leading the American Library Association's Privacy Subcommittee. As Innovations Manager for San José Public Library, she published the book Your Technology Outreach Adventure: Tools for Human-Centered Problem Solving. Currently, she works as the Equitable Libraries Division Director for the Alameda County Library in California and is the co-editor of ALA's next edition of the Intellectual Freedom Manual. Justin Wasterlain is the Assistant Director of the Pacific Library Partnership, a trainer for the ALA Office of Intellectual Freedom's Law for Librarians program, and a member of CLA's Intellectual Freedom Committee. Over the past 27 years, he's worked in a wide variety of library positions, from Page to Management Analyst. In 2007, his interest in privacy and First Amendment issues led him to drop out of a Mortuary Science program and pursue an MLIS degree. Future of the MLIS Degree

Jayanti Addleman has been the Library Director at Hayward since 2019 and prior to that was the County Librarian at the County of Monterey for 12 years. She has worked in a variety of academic and public libraries, as well as in private industry. She has served as President of both the California Library Association and of the California County Librarians Association. Jayanti has been the recipient of many awards recognizing her professional and volunteer contributions, including one of Monterey County's Outstanding Women and ALA's "I Love my Librarian" award. Henry Bankhead is the Deputy Director of the Berkeley Public Library where he works as part of a team to eliminate systemic barriers to resources and services. Previously, he was the City Librarian/Assistant Library and Recreation Director for San Rafael where he used the tools of design thinking to open a new mall library location in a former Payless Shoe Store. Prior to San Rafael, Henry worked at the Los Gatos Library where he was a champion of eBook self-publishing; for his work in this area, he was named a Library Journal Mover & Shaker in 2014. Dr. Anthony Chow is a full professor and director of the School of Information at San José State University. His areas of expertise include information seeking behavior, emerging technologies and library technology integration including AI, leadership and organizational management, UX and usability, and instructional design and technology including online learning. He has served as an LIS faculty member for the past 25 years and has his PhD in instructional systems design and MS in educational psychology from Florida State University. He currently is a



board of director with the California Library Association, the Chinese American Library Association, and Little Free Library and the founder and project director of Reading Nation Waterfall, a \$1.4 million IMLS grant focused on early children's literacy in Native American communities.
